Dear Parents and Carers

As Christmas is fast approaching, it provides me with an opportunity to reflect on what has been a successful first term. We have seen many individual and whole school achievements, including the successful transition of our new starters, a refreshed curriculum and a greater range of meaningful accreditations alongside lots of reward trips and fun filled activities for all of our pupils. I would like to thank all of the staff and pupils for their hard work this term, it is greatly appreciated and makes Orchard Manor a wonderful place to be.

The school has been decorated by pupils and staff, with Christmas trees in classes, communal areas and the residences. Everyone is feeling very festive. Last week, we had a Christmas lunch and everyone wore their Christmas jumpers! The whole school pantomime trip to Torquay was Snow White and as always, it was great fun and pupils thoroughly enjoyed themselves. We also had Christmas productions on both sites and a disco which was a huge success.

Star, our therapy dog, has made great progress during her first term at school. She now has a full timetable across lots of classes, helps out in Thrive sessions and supports Post-16 students with their travel training. Star has also been doing offsite training where she has visited a hospital, library and airport; and of course, she is getting involved with all of the Christmas festivities.

There are exciting developments upcoming for 2020 to further improve our facilities. We are extremely excited to announce that we have been identified by Devon County Council for possible school developments that may include a new Sports Hall, a new vocational building, a new roadway to link the two school sites and improvements to the upper school dining hall. Other developments which are coming in 2020 include a low and high ropes course, mountain bike trail, den building area, sensory garden and the development of the lower school outdoor play, exercise and outdoor music equipment.

We have also just prepared a hard standing to support our Post-16 pupils to start a car washing enterprise and will be shortly purchasing barista equipment to support a further enterprise development.

Thank you to all of you who took part in the Parent Questionnaire at the end of the summer term and a summary of which has been included in this newsletter. The results and analysis will be sent out to all you via email. Your feedback is valued and has been used to inform our ongoing school improvement.



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Parent Questionnaire Feedback

The feedback collected from parents from our survey was fantastic: it was overwhelmingly positive, and includes



some constructive areas for us to focus on for further improvement. In total 63 parent responses were collected in July from the Year 11 Leavers Event, Parents Evenings and from Lower School Sports Day.

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Exciting Developments for 2020!

As part of the SEN strategic review, the local authority, Devon County Council, is looking at increasing the number of special school places across the county. The great news for us is that Orchard Manor School has been identified as one of the schools where capacity can increase. To enable this increase in role, we are being supported with the development of the facilities at Orchard Manor School.

The proposed developments are:

- a new Sports Hall building
- a new vocational building to support construction and mechanics
- a new roadway to link the upper and lower schools to further improve the school's collection and dropoff system
- improvements to the upper school dining room

The plans for these exciting developments have been developed and it is hoped, subject to planning and confirmation of funding, the work for the planned developments will start in 2020. We will be inviting parents and members of the community to a pre-planning information event on Wednesday 22nd January 2020 to give everyone the opportunity to find out further information about the developments, see the plans and ask any questions. Details of this will be sent out to you all after the holiday.

A Christmas visit to Pennywell Farm




We all thoroughly enjoyed the day seeing all the different animals, watching the nativity play and having a visit with Santa.



Rural Skills at Orchard Manor— Autumn Term

During this half term the children have continued with many different projects. The weather has been tricky, as it seems to have rained every day for the last 7 weeks or so, but we have managed to get outside as much as possible and been involved in a number of fantastic projects as you can see!

Hedges

We have been given 150 hedging trees including Rowan, Holly, Field Maple, Oak, Silver Birch, Hawthorn, Crab Apple and Wild Cherry.



The trees are supplied as one year old saplings and are only about 30 cm tall. The children have been busy planting them all in pots in the poly tunnel and then putting the filled pots into the bee enclosure where they can continue to grow.

Christmas Wreaths



On the school site we have 100's of trees, of many varieties, some of them over 150 years old. The woodlands were planted by the family who built the original house. We use Birch, Holly, Ivy and Fir to make Christmas Wreaths, and most classes now have one which they are all proud of, the

children have helped make each one.

They are very simple to make – the birch twigs are twisted and tied together, and then small branches of the other greenery are weaved in, then fastened with some more string. They look very rustic and smell amazing. They can be further decorated with ribbon and baubles.

Chickens

Our hens are still producing eggs every day, they seem very hungry, but they are eating the same amount as in the summer. They only come out of their shed during daylight hours.

Swanny, our rescue cockerel is fully back to health, with a beautiful show of feathers. They are handled every day, so have become very tame, and expect that anyone coming to see them will bring them something to eat.

They mostly eat Layers Mash and Layers Pellets which is made especially for them. They also like corn and lots of weeds and plants. The children are very involved in preparing their food. Some of the classes have used the eggs in cooking lessons too.

Bees

It's a much quieter time of the year for our bees, and some days they haven't been seen at all, they do not like the rain, and they stay inside when it is too cold. The hives will have reduced their numbers so that both have around 20,000 in



each (in the summer this number can be up to 70,000). They have

can be up to 70,000). They have plenty of food to see them through the winter, the honey they made in the summer is harvested by us, but we leave them plenty, and this is topped up with



Bees are very clever at keeping themselves warm, and when inside the hive they are busy at work keeping the Queen safe. Just today, a milder, dry day, they were busy flying and foraging – this was the first time

we have seen them for quite a few days.

Pigs

Look out! After Christmas we will have pigs at Orchard Manor School. We're looking to have 6 Saddleback Piglets. They will live free range, be fed with pellets and will be able to forage woodland in their enormous pen, which is going through refurbishment in readiness for them.

General Maintenance

Lots of seeds have been planted and lots of cuttings have been taken. They are all safely growing in the poly tunnel and will really get going in the spring having had a huge head start in the warmth of the tunnel. In fact,

last summer we grew over 20 types of fruit and vegetables.



In 2020 we want to grow at least 20 varieties each of vegetables,

fruit, herbs and flowers. The early start is very useful.


Fallen Autumn leaves have been raked, almost daily, and we will have an impressive amount of leaf mould next Autumn. The composter is working hard too, and has created lots of beautiful rich compost. Both compost and leaf mould, especially when mixed with chicken manure (of which we now have plenty!) make fantastic soil improvers – our crops should be amazing next year.

The children have enjoyed clearing the leaves, digging over the raised beds, and composting plants as they have died back for winter.

The cold will really begin in the New Year, and we will focus on looking after our wild birds, studying lifecycles of plants and animals in the garden, and waiting patiently for the first frog spawn!

Preparing for Adulthood



Planning for the future, experiencing life changes and getting skills and knowledge for independence is an important time in any young person's life. If you also have

additional support needs and receive support from social care, education and health services, it becomes a time of planning, exploration and agreeing a future direction. This can start from the age of 14.

Young people with SEND should have equal life chances as they move into adulthood. This should include paid employment and higher education, housing options and independent living, good health, friends, community inclusion and choice and control over their lives and support. Ultimately, young people want to have full lives with choices about their future and control of their support.

Devon County Council

The Preparing for Adulthood Team engages with young people, families, carers and the supporting agencies, to



empower young people to capitalise on the opportunities of adulthood, becoming as independent, self-reliant and confident as possible. The aim of the Preparing for Adulthood

team is to implement Devon's Preparing for Adulthood

Parent Progression Project: is a County wide Project designed and coordinated by Exeter Community Initiatives. Working in partnership with Action for Children and Devon County Council, we provide universal support to parents wishing to learn new skills by retraining, access volunteering opportunities, gain work experience and find paid employment. The project will build on Exeter Community Initiatives strong base in Exeter and we will endeavour to replicate its knowledge of networks and relationships with local services where you live. We provide a range of support: 1 -1 or group meetings to help you plan your first steps. Identify where you are and the distance you need to travel in order to reach your potential. Help you to realise your skills and the achievements

you have made already. Help you to discover your strengths and how you can do more. Help your confidence to grow. We believe that finding work is one of the ways to improve the wellbeing of individuals, help parents support their families and provide the opportunity to contribute to the wider community.

Strategy, supporting young people who are likely to have needs for care and support into adulthood.

How do you get support from the Preparing for Adulthood Team?

If you are a young person between the age of 12 and 18, their parent or carer seeking support from the Preparing for Adulthood Team, you will need to complete the new web referral form. If you have already given consent and are known to our service, there is no need to fill out a form. If you aren't sure, please complete the form. Due to General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) changes, the school are no longer able to send direct referrals to the Preparing for Adulthood team, however we can make a referral on your behalf and you will be contacted by the service.

Preparing for Adulthood – Annual Reviews

If a referral is made to the Preparing for Adulthood service, and further information is required, a representative can attend your son or daughter's Annual Review in Year 10 or 11 and begin a process of assessment to work out what support could be needed in the future. If eligible, they will initiate the transition to Adult Services and you should receive contact from an allocated team around your son or daughter's seventeenth birthday; they will attend Annual Reviews during Post-16 education or training and beyond, working with you and school to access services and targeted support from social care that works for your family.
